

Mauritania Mixed-Migration Dynamics Study (3MDS)

About the Project

The Atlantic migration route through Mauritania saw a significant increase in activity, driven by stricter controls along traditional Mediterranean routes through Libya, Tunisia, and Morocco in 2023 and early 2024. Despite this intensification of migration flows, available data on migrants in Mauritania remains scarce and fragmented.

Part of a larger intervention supporting the operationalisation of the Joint Declaration establishing a Migration Partnership between the Islamic Republic of Mauritania and the European Union, signed in March 2024, this Technical Assistance project addressed this gap by generating new, high-quality data that can support evidence-based policymaking and programme development.

Specifically, a quantitative study was conducted on the profiles and experiences of international migrants, migration factors, decision-making, aspirations, risks and protection needs along the routes to and in Mauritania. The research analysed mixed migration dynamics and trends along the Atlantic route with a focus on smuggling and base its findings upon the data collected and the local context.

Activities



Field Research

A total of 1,007 interviews were conducted across selected locations, including Nouakchott and Nouadhibou. The survey examined migrants' profiles, experiences, decision-making processes, protection needs, and questions related to smuggling of migrants.

Findings were summarised into a research publication offering an in-depth analysis of mixed migration dynamics and trends along the Atlantic route, with a focus on smuggling of migrants. This publication provided insights to support policy development and migration governance efforts in Mauritania and beyond.



Targeted Engagement

Once the research phase concluded, the project facilitated a series of discussions with relevant policymakers, practitioners, and relevant actors to discuss the implications of the findings for programming and policy responses.
